Meditation - Rooted in Blessing: Trusting in God's Sustaining Grace

There is something deeply reassuring about the image of a tree planted by water. Jeremiah gives us this image as a way of understanding what it means to trust in God. A tree with deep roots, reaching into the stream, is nourished and sustained, no matter what conditions arise around it. When the heat comes, when the drought arrives, the tree does not fear because it is connected to its source of life.

And then, Jeremiah contrasts this image with another—of a shrub in the desert, struggling to survive, cut off from the richness of the soil, withering in the harsh

conditions. This shrub represents those who place their trust in human strength alone, relying only on their own resources rather than the abundance of God.

As we hear these words, we are invited to ask ourselves: Where are my roots planted? Am I drawing from the deep well of God's presence, or am I struggling to sustain myself in dry, barren places?

Jesus offers us a vision of blessing that might at first seem surprising—even unsettling. He stands on a level plain, surrounded by crowds of people who have come from all over to hear him, to be healed, to find hope. And instead of affirming the world's usual measures of success, he blesses the poor, the hungry, the grieving, the rejected.

"Blessed are you who are poor, for yours is the kingdom of God. Blessed are you who hunger now, for you will be filled. Blessed are you who weep now, for you will laugh."

Jesus' words remind us that God's kingdom is not built on wealth, status, or worldly power. Instead, it is built on trust, humility, and a heart that longs for something deeper. The blessed are not those who have everything figured out, but those who recognize their need for God.

And then, just as Jeremiah warned against trusting in human strength, Jesus gives a word of caution:

"Woe to you who are rich... woe to you who are full now... woe to you who laugh now... woe to you when all speak well of you."

At first, these words may seem harsh, but they are not a condemnation. Rather, they serve as a wake-up call. They remind us that when we are too comfortable, too self-sufficient, we can forget our dependence on God. The world tells us to seek wealth, comfort, and approval, but Jesus reminds us that these things are fleeting. True life, true joy, comes from something deeper.

So how do we live as people who are like trees planted by the water? How do we cultivate trust in God rather than in our own strength?

First, we root ourselves in prayer and scripture. Just as a tree draws from its source every day, we need to draw near to God daily. When we spend time with God—through prayer, through reflecting on His Word, through worship—we find the strength we need to endure life's challenges.

Second, we trust in God even when times are difficult. The tree planted by water does not fear the heat or the drought because its roots are deep. When difficulties arise in our own lives—loss, uncertainty, hardship—do we panic and try to fix everything on our own, or do we turn to God, trusting that He will sustain us? Third, we seek the kind of blessing Jesus describes. The world tells us that success comes from wealth, recognition, and ease. But Jesus calls us to a different kind of blessing—one that comes from compassion, generosity, and dependence on God. Being planted by the water means that we are willing to be vulnerable, to acknowledge our need, to weep with those who weep, and to hunger for justice.

Each of us must ask ourselves: Where are my roots planted? Am I drawing from the living water of God's presence, or am I trying to rely on my own strength?

When we plant ourselves in God's love, we are not promised an easy life. But we are promised sustaining grace. Like a tree that remains steady through every season, we can stand firm in faith, knowing that God is our refuge and strength.

So today, let us turn to God in trust. Let us place our hope not in what the world values, but in the deep, abiding love of Christ. Let us seek to be people who, even in times of drought, continue to bear fruit—spreading love, compassion, and justice wherever we go.

And as we go forth, may we remember: We are not alone. We are rooted in blessing. We are sustained by grace.
